What is the Questors Theatre and what does it do?

ACTIVITY

The Questors is one of the leading Little Theatres in London. Its members have their own theatre in Mattock Lane, Ealing. It is not a commercial entertainment house, but a home for the development of the theatre arts, and a theatre for the presentation of the greatest and best drama in the world. The high aim of "furthering the interests of dramatic art" is regarded as a very real and practical ideal.

POLICY

Members and visitors to the Questors theatre will not see a rehash of a popular play but an artistic production based on the following precepts:—

- (1) The maintenance of the highest standard of choice of play.
- (2) The continuation and improvement of the artistic standards of the production.
- (3) A contribution to the art of the theatre as a whole.

ART THEATRE

The Questors Theatre is not a training ground for professional actors and actresses to proceed to the repertory and commercial theatres, but it is an art theatre in the true sense of the word, training and developing its producers and actors by opportunity and experience to develop integrity and truth in their work.

ENTERTAINMENT

It must not be thought that the Questors scorn entertainment in any way; on the contrary, the *first aim* of the productions presented every seven weeks to its theatre membership of nearly one thousand, is entertainment of the best and most satisfactory kind.

LITTLE THEATRE GUILD

The work of the theatre has developed considerably during the last twenty years, and the Questors now stands in a unique position among Little Theatres. The foundation in 1946 of the Little Theatre Guild of Great Britain, of which the Questors is one of the foundermembers, was the culmination of a phase in Little Theatre development. The Questors acts as Secretary to the Guild, which includes such famous theatres as the Civic Playhouse at Bradford, the Macdermarket Theatre at Norwich, and the People's Theatre in Newcastle. This Guild has already made and will make its mark on the future development of the whole theatre in Great Britain.

NOTE ON THE PLAY

This play might be called a near-tragedy—a play which fate turned from tragedy to comedy—the reverse perhaps of what we usually think. Although artificiality is apparent throughout the play, Professor Allardyce Nicol considers it one of Shakespeare's greatest masterpieces. It is an unusual play and not always easy to understand—a classic which was probably written for a more sophisticated and cultured audience than most of Shakespeare's great plays.

Harley Granville-Barker's imaginative production of the play in 1912 will always be recorded with Henry Ainley as Leontes—a production which for verve and tempo opened the audience's eyes to the new possibilities of imaginative Shakespeare production.

This play was one of the last that Shakespeare wrote in Stratford in 1608—1609, and was in the repertoire of the King's men when they performed at Court in 1610. They appeared 15 times in all and it is interesting to know that they were paid £30 over and above their usual £10 a performance because for six weeks prior to Christmas "infection" had prevented their appearing at the theatres. The play was first played at the Globe in April or May of the following year.
