





AYCKBOURN ...

. . . on drama and comedy

First, there is the drama or straight play which is usually rather short on humour but filled with Insights and other Serious Things and is thus, when successful, regarded as a Very Good Thing to See, Comedies, on the other hand, are straight plays with a sense of humour, often saving much the same thing only more enjoyably and therefore to a wider audience. A very few comedies can occasionally achieve the Very Good Thing category but generally only if (a) the director has removed all the humour from it by playing it with funereal solemnity or (b) the author is long dead, foreign, or preferably both. If the author is foreign, the chances are the translator will have killed off most of the humour anyway (cf. Molière, Goldoni), If very long dead, then most of the audiences don't understand the jokes anyway (cf. Shakespeare).

... on Marriage

The marriages I see are either fraught or dull. There are one or two very happy ones, but that's probably because they're new . . .

... I think a hig piece of us dies in a murriage. We enter it, often spoilt, only children and in general, it goes one of two ways: we're either very bed at adjusting at all—we say: "Yes, I don't mind marrying you, but I do object to the fact that you want this over there. Or one personality, being stronger, will eclipse the other. Somethat happens by slow erosion—in the woman's case it's probably a long term marathon: she'll just whittle away...
