

ABOUT THE PLAY

THE SUBJECT of a shrewish woman and how to tame her had been written about long before Shakespeare. The Ancient Greeks were familiar with the type, in Xanthippe, and Chaucer's wonderful creation, the Wife of Bath, became an archetype. Shakespeare's subplot too, in which the various suitors to Bianca disguise themselves as tutors to gain admittance to Baptista's house, was thought to have been based on an Italian play, I Suppositi by Ariosto, about taking on new identities.

The origins of the version we know today, which is based on the Folio edition of 1623, are mysterious. There is no Quarto text, although there is a Quarto dated 1594 of a play called 'The Taming of A Shrew'. This is a very garbled version of Shakespeare's text, and appears to contain chunks of verse lifted from Marlowe. The most likely explanation is that Shakespeare's *The Shrew* was written first and that A Shrew was a rough version put together from memory by actors and dramatists on tour in the provinces without promptbooks. Between 1592 and 1594, England was hit by the worst plague of the Elizabethan years, and the London theatres closed. Actors kept going only by splitting up into small touring companies and often had to sell or pawn what little they had (including, presumably, their books) to eat.

The plot of *The Taming of the Shrew* is relatively straightforward and uncluttered — unusually so for Shakespeare. Baptista, a nobleman of Padua, has two daughters Bianca, the younger, is much wooed while Kate, the elder ('The Shrew') has no suitors. Baptista insists that Bianca may not marry before Kate and settles a considerable dowry on his elder daughter. Petruchio, an adventurer, undertakes to woo Kate, partly for the money and partly to help his friend Hortensio who is one of Bianca's suitors. After a series of verbal and physical fireworks Petruchio marries Kate and takes her to his country house.

Bianca is eventually won by Lucentio, one of Hortensio's rivals, while the latter ends up with a rich widow. In a bizarre wager at the end of the play as to whose wife is the most submissive, Petruchio surprisingly wins — The Shrew has been tamed.
