

THE AUTHOR AND THE BACKGROUND TO THE PLAY

RICHARD BRINSLEY SHERIDAN was born in Dublin in 1751 and educated at Harrow. He was a young man of only twenty-three when he wrote *The Rivals*. The play was written in a hurry because he needed money urgently at the time. As a result of both his youthful inexperience and his hasty composition the original version of *The Rivals* was not entirely successful. Sheridan revised the play, however, and it became, and has remained to this day, one of the most popular comedies in the English theatre.

Sheridan was able to write his first play quickly because he had the advantage of having grown up in a literary and theatrical family. His mother Frances Sheridan was a playwright and novelist and he probably borrowed some ideas for The Rivals from her play, A Journey to Bath. His father Thomas Sheridan was an actor and theatre-manager who later became a teacher of elocution and the writer of an English dictionary. Sheridan was an intelligent, witty and fun-loving young man whose real ambition was to become a politician. After his success with The Rivals he wrote several more plays, including a comic masterpiece, The School for Scandal (1777) and a very funny burlesque of contemporary theatrical practices, The Critic; or, a Tragedy Rehearsed (1779). He also became manager of one of the two great London theatres of the time, the Theatre Royal, Drury Lane, where he followed in the footsteps of David Garrick (1717-79), the greatest and most famous English actor in the eighteenth century. In 1780 Sheridan achieved his ambition and became a member of Parliament and thereafter concentrated his talents on writing political speeches instead of plays. Towards the end of his life he became a gambler and heavy drinker. In 1809 the Drury Lane Theatre, for which he was still responsible, was destroyed by fire; as a result of this disaster Sheridan was in severe financial difficulty for the rest of his life. He lost his seat in Parliament in 1812. His last few years were miserable as he suffered from both poverty and bad health and he died in 1816 a sadly disillusioned man. He was given a splendid public funeral and is buried in Westminster Abbey.

Bath: city of pleasure

The Rivals is entirely set in the city of Bath. Sheridan knew Bath well, having lived there, and probably many of those in the first audience of The Rivals would have been there too, as visitors, for, in Sheridan's lifetime, Bath was one of the most fashionable and popular resorts in the country. The city, however, provided more than a mere geographical and physical setting for the play. Bath had a strong hold on the imagination of the time as a place of pleasure and romance. Young people longed to go there because of the many opportunities Bath offered for meeting members of the opposite sex, for dancing, flirting and perhaps falling in love. By setting his play in Bath, Sheridan creates a world very familiar to his eighteenth-century audiences as a world of both reality and illusion.
