Director's note

Godspell as conceived by John-Michael Tebelak is a jubilant celebration of the Gospel as told by St. Matthew. It was the belief of John-Michael and his generation that the passion of Jesus Christ was to teach love and joy in the hearts of people rather than hate and sadness.

In staging these well-known sayings and stories of the Bible, John-Michael called on many theatrical devices – pantomime, children's games, charades, puppetry, vaudeville antics, minstrel shows, tap and soft shoe dancing and songs and music of many colors – folk, ballad, pop, rock, light musical comedy and dramatic.

The actors are cast primarily as clowns, in improvised costumes, to enact the simple stories, sayings and parables of the Gospel.

Lawrence Carra Professor of Play Directing Carnegie-Mellon University, USA

The first performance of *Godspell* was "off" Broadway on 17th May 1971 at the Cherry Lane Theatre, New York. Stephen Nothian played Jesus and David Haskell played Judas for 2,124 performances. It later moved to the Broadhurst Theatre on Broadway for another 527 performances.

A film was made in 1973 starring Victor Garber, David Haskell, Jerry Sroka, Lynne Thigpen and Robin Lamont. "Hippies in the streets of New York! Somewhere between Sesame Street and the gospel according to Laugh-In" – Bruce Williamson.

The first London run was at Wyndham's Theatre with Julie Covington, David Essex, Marti Webb and Jeremy Irons. It ran for three years.
