

### The Questors Youth Theatre

In January 2004 an organisation called Y-Touring theatre approached me asking if our Youth Theatre would like to participate in 'The Pulse Project'. The Glaxo Wellcome Trust had awarded Y-Touring funding to commission professional playwrights to write four new plays in conjunction with four youth theatres tackling biomedical science issues. My notion that this might become a dry and academic exercise was soon dispelled when Y-touring, Jonathan Hall (our nominated playwright) and a quest scientist ran a workshop in the February half term with an enthusiastic group of our members. It was from the ideas generated in this workshop that Jonathan based his play. Over the ensuing months drafts were written and the project co-ordinated and rehearsed by director and QYT group leader Dominique Gerrard and Heidi Arnold from Y-Touring. The resulting play Scenes from the Fair was staged by QYT for one evening at The Compass Theatre in Ickenham and forms the second half of this evening's bill. Most of the cast you see tonight are the original workshop participants.

The idea of a new play written especially for our Youth Theatre excited me and prompted me to wonder if any of our youth group members were budding writers. I put a call out to all the groups and received more submissions than. I expected. Youth Theatre members wrote all the five short plays that make up the first half of this evening's performance. It is the first time that any of them have had their work performed in public.

So there we have it. New writing for young people and new writing by young people. It seems appropriate that after last year's focus on our past (celebrating our 50th anniversary with a production of A Midsummer Nights Dream) that this year we should cast our eyes to the future.

This project has been a real learning curve for me in discovering the genuine, well-meaning roots of this once respectable science and I believe that Jonathan Hall's play explores the more personal aspects of a complicated issue.

I have been convinced by this play, and working with these young people, that good theatre can be successfully combined with science, that it can educate and entertain in equal measure and that it should and can pose questions which we take home with us when we leave.
