

## COGNER AU PLAFOND

### **COGNER AU PLAFOND**

The idea of creating a bilingual French-English play arose last summer, and the 2005 riots in France suggested themselves as an interesting tonic both to myself and Questors Youth Theatre members. The theme has proved a thorny one to understand from an outsider's perspective. requiring several months of research and juggling of ideas before any words hit the page. However, it has proved to be an extremely valuable and topical subject, particularly given the impending presidential elections in France. Recent weeks have seen a welter of articles on France's struggle with disenchanted youth. fractured society and the challenges of interculturalism. In arts spheres, we're seeing projects which centre around unresolved issues relating to French colonialism in North Africa, such as the recent film. Davs of Glory.

Cagare au Plafond, therefore, is a small contribution to the French debate. It does not presume, of course, to answer any questions, merely seeking to expiore some of the social issues from the perspective of teenagers illung on a housing estate, and the possible reasons for youth riots. The play suggests that the biggest frustration experienced by French teenagers is a lack of opportunity, due to a combination of factors: racism, poor housing and the stagnant nature of French society. According to a recent survey conducted by the Centre for Research on Education, Training and Employment (CEREQ), unemployment among young people in France is running at around 15%.

In addition to these chronic factors, Cogner also considers some of the more acute problems that young people from the French suburban hinterland claim to experience. One of these is police harasment and police-youth relations have been cited frequently as providing the catalyst for social unrest. However, this is clearly a polemical area and we do not seek to cast aspersions on the French police force. However, Mathleu Kassovitz's film, La Haine, makes just such a suggestion. The October 2005 riots which began in the built-up Paris suburb of Clichy sous Bols, were said to have been similarly trigigered by.

deaths by electrocution, of the two teenagers, Zyed Benna et Bouna Traore, who ran into an electricity plant, while trying to escape from the police. When enquiries later asked why the police were chasing them, the only answer appeared to be because the boys were running, As to why the boys were running, we can only speculate that it was because the police were chasing them.

Cogner au Plafond has a fictitious plot which, nonetheless, obviously and unselfconsciously draws on some of these recent events. A further recent tragedy which provided the starting point for our story was the death of faoufik El-Amri in December of last year. Of Tunisian origin, Taoufik was supposed to be in police custody, charged with being drunk and disorderly, but: was released onto the street in the early hours of the morning while still in a fragile state. After a tussle with a homeless person, he seems to have fallen into the canal, where he drowned.

We dedicate our story, therefore, to these victims of social unrest.

#### A note on language

The French used in the play is mostly straightforward, GCSE/A Level standard French. However, an attempt has been made to touch on a more current youth-style language with the inclusion of a few words of slang, the odd swearword and a short exploration of the very specific French backslang known as verlan (which is backwards for l'envers, which means backwards); and, of course, because language is always developing and verlan has been around for a few years, the words in our play are already out-of-date. Some original verlan words have become so incorporated into the French language, that they themselves are now subjected to the backwardsing process: so the term, 'beur', a word used to refer to French people of North African origin, and created from the word. Arab, has now become, 'rebeu'.

Productions are enormously important to the Ouestors Youth Theatre, giving its members an opportunity to audition for, and be involved in, a fully staged show as well as continuing to develop and nurture their performance skills. As a youth group leader, it is evident to me how much young actors learn from being in a play and having the chance to apply the work they do in their weekly classes, building their confidence and their stagecraft. The opportunity Wanda and I had to develop the play together with the cast allows the process to be organic and provides a space for learning, for us as directors as well as for the cast. Bi-lingual projects such as Cogner au Plafond - and Goat Boy, our first project of this type in Spanish and English - have the added

dimension of a language barrier, as well as the standard theatrical challenges of development of character and story. This project serves as a great learning lool for the actors involved and, potentially, for audience members who are learning French; but we also prioritise the pure theatrical value of the show. It is vital that the characters are clear and the story is communicated. If we achieve both then such a play can be accessible to all and can be a successful balance of education and entertainment, as the themes of the play – love, betrayal, discrimination and hope – are universal and timeless.
