

Shakespoard wrote Macbeth when a new king, a Scot who was a believer in witchcraft, superstition and the divine right of kings, sat on the united thrones of England and Scotland, The production bends history, just as Shakespoare clid at a time when Britain had just survived a major war and had a new monarch.

Neal Coward's pray Peace in Quir Time speculated on a Billiain which had tast the second word war. Shakespeare often holds a distorted mirror to history for political or dismatic purposes, and so does this production, about a country in an era of change, with new regimes struggling to establish order and strasping at power.
