What would Walt Disney do?

On being told I was to direct Aphra Behn's restoration comedy about Civil War Cavaliers on the razzle in a foreign country, this seemed to me a perfectly reasonable question to ask. I had some basic facts to guide me. Born a before's daughter, Behn sport her teenage years in India, married a Dutchman and, after his death, spied on the Dutch on Charles II's behalf. After spending time in a debtors' prison she turned to writing plays to earn a living, becoming a successful and profilic playwingth. Before finally been buyined at the sace of 94 in Westmister's Albev.

Yes, but what about Disney? Back to the facts. Behn lived through four monarchies and a civil war (sounds like a film!). Charles II attended the premier of *The Rover* in 1677 and would have recognised the plight of noble men exited abroad without money but out to party. I'm getting to Walt.

Behn based the play on Thomas Killigrew's Thomaso, a play written to be read in private, Comwell having closed the theaters and outsweld fun. Behn took the plot (and a lot of the dielogue) but made The Rover her own by changing the way the female characters were prepresented. In fact, it is the depiction of female sexuality and the way men divide women into virigine or whores that Behn makes so interesting and so powerful. Behn emphasised the carmival atmosphere more than Killigrew had allowed himself and she used the carmival to allow the women to explore sexual freedom. Thinking about restoration theatre and the restoration of Charles II (who is present in the background of Behn's play), I wanted our version of *The Rover* to be as fun and high-spirited as possible. I turned to Disney's cartoon extravaganza Fantasia and, in the spectacle of dancing crocodiles, mincing pachyderms, amorous centaurs and drunken satyrs, I dew my inspiration.

I changed the setting of the play from Naples to Venice and dispensed with a set, traditional period costumes, and even standard Playhouse sound and lighting. I wanted the actors to create Venice before our eyes.

Behn's play has undergone a revival since John Barton and the RSC re-staged it in the 1980s. Recent versions have been set in India and in a girls' dorm, with four teenage girls staging it during a sleepover, using Ken and Barbie dolls and a floppyeared toy dog.

Biographies

Sarah Andrews - Costume Designer

Sarah joined Questors in 1977 as a member of Student Group 32 and stince gradualing has appearad in many plays at the Questors, most recently in The Comedy of Errors. Sarah is one of the tribum/fale that runs ihe Costume Department and has designed and dressed a countless number of shows, most recently A Christmas Card, The Conney of Errors and The Accingtion Pals.

Tom completed Student Group 61 in 2008. He has played various roles in The Caucasian Chalk Circle, including the doctor, Monk and Shauva, as well as Lysander in A Midsummer Night's Dream and Seyton in Macbeth. He is glad to be back at Questors.

The Questors at The Minack Theatre

The Questors Theatre is very privileged to have been invited to take this production of The Rover to the beautiful Minack Theatre, set in the cliffs of the Cornish coast at Porthcurno. This will be the 22" production that we will have presented there since taking Alan Chambers' production of Racine's Phaedra in August 1967

The creation of The Minack Theatre is largely due to the efforts of one very determined woman - Rowena Cade. It started in 1932 with a production of The Tempest on a simple stage lit by little more than battery-powered headlights before some very rough seating. But the seed was sown and, from then on, Rowena and her team of Billy Rawlings and Tom Angove strove to cut the present theatre from the rock face and to build the seating with cement made with sand dragged up from the beach. The dressing rooms were built using massive wooden beams blown ashore from a shiowreck and famously 'misappropriated' by Rowena. Billy died in 1966. but Tom continued until his retirement in 1993. Rowena passed away in 1983, just short of her 90th birthday, leaving extensive plans for future development, including sketches of how the theatre could be covered on wet days (it seems unlikely that these will be implemented). Since then, the theatre has been run by a trust and recent years have seen the addition of more seating areas, a restaurant and shop facilities, and all year opening for visitors. Technical facilities have been greatly enhanced and live webcams allow those left at home to monitor a production's progress.
