DOCTOR FAUSTUS

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Doctor Faustus

Doctor Faustus is a play full of tension and conflict between an individual's thirst for power and the abuse of that power; between his craving for knowledge and waste of intelligence. It's also a play about opposites: God (not that He's much in evidence here) and the Devil (who very much is); man (What art thou, Faustus, but a man condemned to die?') and superman ('A sound magician is a mightly god'); vaulting ambition ('I'll be great emperor of the world') and base reality. Marlowe's anti-heroic scholar, once his pact with Lucifer is signed, is no more in mightly god' than was Georg of Helmstadt, the self-styled astrologer and magician on whom Mariowe's character is based. There is also a dichotomy within the play itself: the high tragedy of Faustus's speeches and the low comedy of his pranks at the expense of the Pope, a knight and a horse dealer — challenges for hoth Marlowian scholars and theatre directors allike.

Recent scientific, artistic and philosophical concerns have all had their effect on 20th and 21st century productions of the play. A Glasgow Citizens production in 1968 had a dialogue between Faustus and Robert Oppenheimer, the inventor of the atomic bomb, on scientific responsibility. A 2002 Northampton production fused artistic with political debate and involved controversial BritArt stars Jake and Dinos Chapman: a site-specific showing of the play currently running in Oxford unfolds the action in the philosophy department of Blackwell's Bookshop, thus reinforcing the play as an investigation into the nature of moral inquiry. Our own offering imagines the play in Cambridge (where Marlowe attended Corpus Christi College) and presents a film-noirish world of dark hearts and little in the way of goodness. Film noir - with its shadows and villains and cynical take on human nature - has been a principal inspiration for this production and seems to me to reflect what Marlowe shows us in Doctor Faustus: a world closer to hell than heaven. At its centre is an erudite child-man whose tragi-comedy asks of us; is man a failure or is he a magnificent failure?

Please note that this Questors production is an adapted and abridged version of the so-called 'A-text' (1604) as opposed to the extended and revised 'B-text' (1616).

Christopher Marlowe

Marlowe was born in February 1564 in Canterbury, to a shoemaker named John Marlowe and his wife Catherine, just two months before his contemporary, Shakespeare, was born in Stratford-upon-Avon.

Marlowe attended The King's School, Canterbury and Corpus Christi College, Cambridge on a scholarship and received his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1584, in 1587 the university hesitated to award him his Master's degree until the Privy Council intervened on his behalf, commending him for his faithful dealing and good service' to Quene Elizabeth. This has led to much speculation that he was operating, even then, as a secret agent working for Sir Francis Walsingham's intelligence service.

Marlowe's first drama was Dido, Queen of Corthage, but Tamburlaine The Great (1537) was the first to be performed on the London stage. The subsequent order of performances of his plays is largely unknown, but The Tragicall History of the Life and Death of Doctor Faustus first appeared in ordr in 1582.

It has often been alleged that Marlowe was a government spy and that he was inserted as tutor to the niceo of Mary, Queen of Scotts, a strong candidate for the succession to Elizabeth's throne. He was also arrested in The Netherlands in 1592 for involvement in the counterfeiting of coins, possibly disrupting a plan to buy his way into the confidence of Catholic plotters. No charges were brought.

Another warrant was issued for Marlowe's arrest on 18 May 1593. No reason for it was given, though it was thought to be connected to allegations of biasphemy – a manuscript believed to have been written by Marlowe was said to contain 'vile heretical conceipts'. He was brought before the Privy Council for questioning on 20 May, after which he had to report to them daily. Ten days later, he was stabbed to death by Ingram Frizer, supposedly in a drunken brawl. Whether the stabbing was connected to his arrest has never been resolved.
